Speaker: Darin Newsom, Senior Analyst, DTN/The Progressive Farmer

This discussion will tackle the key issue of a changing market structure at a time when agriculture appears to be most vulnerable. Supply and demand issues are evolving and investment is moving elsewhere, raising the guestion of what will become of our industry in the future. Since the 2005o6 marketing year, agriculture has been caught up in corn's demand market sparked by passage of the Energy Policy Act of 2005. This market survived the global economic collapse of 2008, bolstered by less-than-favorable weather across the U.S. Midwest from 2009 through 2012. However, as 2013 showed, agriculture has undergone another major change as the same investment outlook that pushed the market higher has shifted. This should continue in 2014 and ripple effect will be felt across all of agriculture.






